UNDERSTANDING THE FUNDAMENTALS OF HORSE BODY LANGUAGE

HORSES ARE PREY ANIMALS, AND AS SUCH, THEY HAVE EVOLVED A SOPHISTICATED SYSTEM OF NON-VERBAL COMMUNICATION TO SURVIVE AND THRIVE. THEIR BODY LANGUAGE IS A CONSTANT STREAM OF INFORMATION, CONVEYING THEIR EMOTIONAL STATE, LEVEL OF COMFORT, AWARENESS OF THEIR SURROUNDINGS, AND THEIR INTENTIONS TOWARDS OTHER HORSES OR HUMANS. RECOGNIZING THAT A HORSE'S SIGNALS ARE OFTEN A COMPOSITE OF SEVERAL CUES, RATHER THAN A SINGLE ISOLATED MOVEMENT, IS THE FIRST STEP IN BECOMING A PROFICIENT INTERPRETER.

THE ENVIRONMENT PLAYS A CRUCIAL ROLE IN HOW A HORSE EXPRESSES ITSELF. A HORSE IN A FAMILIAR, SAFE PASTURE MIGHT EXHIBIT DIFFERENT BODY LANGUAGE THAN ONE IN A BUSTLING COMPETITION ARENA OR A NEW, POTENTIALLY THREATENING SITUATION. UNDERSTANDING THE CONTEXT OF THE INTERACTION IS AS IMPORTANT AS DECIPHERING THE INDIVIDUAL SIGNALS. THIS GUIDE AIMS TO EQUIP YOU WITH THE KNOWLEDGE TO INTERPRET THESE SIGNALS ACCURATELY, FOSTERING A SAFER AND MORE REWARDING RELATIONSHIP WITH HORSES.

HEAD AND NECK SIGNALS: THE HORSE'S PRIMARY COMMUNICATION CHANNEL

THE HEAD AND NECK REGION OF A HORSE IS INCREDIBLY EXPRESSIVE, ACTING AS A PRIMARY CHANNEL FOR COMMUNICATING A WIDE RANGE OF EMOTIONS AND INTENTIONS. SUBTLE SHIFTS IN THESE AREAS CAN REVEAL A HORSE'S LEVEL OF ENGAGEMENT, CURIOSITY, ANXIETY, OR RELAXATION. PAYING CLOSE ATTENTION TO THESE MOVEMENTS IS FUNDAMENTAL TO UNDERSTANDING YOUR EQUINE COMPANION.

EAR MOVEMENTS AND THEIR MEANINGS

THE EARS OF A HORSE ARE HIGHLY SENSITIVE AND CAN ROTATE ALMOST 180 DEGREES INDEPENDENTLY, ALLOWING THEM TO PINPOINT SOUNDS. THEIR POSITION PROVIDES SIGNIFICANT INSIGHT INTO THEIR ATTENTION AND EMOTIONAL STATE. A HORSE'S EARS ARE OFTEN THE MOST OBVIOUS AND IMMEDIATE INDICATORS OF THEIR FOCUS.

- **FORWARD AND ALERT:** WHEN A HORSE'S EARS ARE POINTED FORWARD, IT INDICATES THEY ARE ATTENTIVE AND INTERESTED IN SOMETHING IN FRONT OF THEM. THIS COULD BE A PERSON, ANOTHER ANIMAL, OR A NEW OBJECT.
- **RELAXED AND NEUTRAL:** EARS HELD SOFTLY TO THE SIDE, SLIGHTLY FLOPPED, OR POINTING BACKWARD IN A RELAXED MANNER SUGGEST THE HORSE IS CALM AND AT EASE.
- **PINNED FLAT BACK:** THIS IS A STRONG SIGNAL OF ANGER, IRRITATION, OR A WILLINGNESS TO BITE. IT OFTEN PRECEDES AGGRESSION AND IS A CLEAR WARNING TO BACK OFF.
- **SWIVELING RAPIDLY:** THIS INDICATES A HEIGHTENED STATE OF ALERTNESS AND SCANNING OF THE ENVIRONMENT FOR POTENTIAL THREATS OR INTERESTING STIMULI.
- **ONE EAR FORWARD, ONE BACKWARD:** THIS SUGGESTS THE HORSE IS LISTENING TO SOMETHING BEHIND THEM WHILE STILL MAINTAINING SOME AWARENESS OF WHAT'S IN FRONT.

EYE EXPRESSIONS: WINDOWS TO THE EQUINE SOUL

A HORSE'S EYES CAN REVEAL A WEALTH OF INFORMATION ABOUT THEIR EMOTIONAL STATE, FROM CALM CONTENTMENT TO EXTREME FEAR. OBSERVING THE SIZE OF THE PUPIL, THE AMOUNT OF SCLERA (WHITE) VISIBLE, AND THE OVERALL EXPRESSION OF THE EYE IS CRUCIAL.

- **SOFT, RELAXED EYES:** WITH NORMAL PUPIL SIZE AND MINIMAL SCLERA VISIBLE, THIS INDICATES A CALM AND CONTENT HORSE.
- **WIDE EYES WITH VISIBLE SCLERA:** THIS IS A CLEAR SIGN OF FEAR, ANXIETY, OR ALARM. THE HORSE IS FEELING THREATENED OR SCARED.
- **HARD STARE:** A FIXED, INTENSE GAZE, OFTEN WITH NARROWED EYELIDS, CAN INDICATE AGGRESSION, DOMINANCE, OR A CHALLENGE.
- **SQUINTING OR HALF-CLOSED EYES:** THIS CAN SIGNIFY PLEASURE, RELIEF, OR DEEP RELAXATION, PARTICULARLY WHEN COMBINED WITH OTHER RELAXED BODY SIGNALS.

MOUTH AND LIP SIGNALS: REVEALING MOOD AND INTENT

THE HORSE'S MOUTH AND LIPS ARE REMARKABLY EXPRESSIVE, CONVEYING SUBTLE SHIFTS IN MOOD, FROM ENJOYMENT TO DISCOMFORT OR MILD ANNOYANCE. THESE SIGNALS OFTEN ACCOMPANY OTHER CUES AND PROVIDE A MORE NUANCED UNDERSTANDING.

- **SOFT, RELAXED LIPS:** A SLACK JAW AND RELAXED LIPS ARE INDICATIVE OF A CALM AND CONTENT HORSE.

- **BITING OR NIBBLING:** THIS CAN RANGE FROM PLAYFUL NIPS (COMMON AMONG FOALS AND WELL-SOCIALIZED HORSES) TO AGGRESSIVE BITING, WHICH IS A SERIOUS WARNING.
- **LIP CURLING (FLEHMEN RESPONSE):** WHEN A HORSE CURLS ITS UPPER LIP UPWARDS, IT'S OFTEN A WAY TO DRAW SCENT INTO THE VOMERONASAL ORGAN, ALLOWING THEM TO ANALYZE SMELLS MORE EFFECTIVELY. IT'S COMMON AFTER ENCOUNTERING NEW OR STRONG SCENTS.
- **GRINDING TEETH:** THIS CAN INDICATE PAIN OR DISCOMFORT, BUT IN SOME SOCIAL INTERACTIONS, IT CAN ALSO BE A SIGN OF SUBMISSION OR APPEASEMENT.
- **MOUTHING OR GNAWING ON OBJECTS:** THIS CAN SIGNIFY BOREDOM, STRESS, OR A HABIT.

NOSE AND NOSTRIL CLUES: SUBTLE INDICATORS OF EMOTION

WHILE OFTEN OVERLOOKED, THE NOSTRILS OF A HORSE CAN PROVIDE SUBTLE BUT IMPORTANT CLUES ABOUT THEIR EMOTIONAL STATE AND PHYSIOLOGICAL RESPONSES.

- **FLARED NOSTRILS:** THIS USUALLY INDICATES EXCITEMENT, EXERTION, FEAR, OR ANGER. IT'S A SIGN OF INCREASED RESPIRATION AND READINESS FOR ACTION.
- **DILATED NOSTRILS:** SIMILAR TO FLARED NOSTRILS, DILATED NOSTRILS CAN INDICATE INCREASED AROUSAL, WHETHER DUE TO EXCITEMENT, FEAR, OR EXERTION.
- **RELAXED NOSTRILS:** SOFT, UNCONSTRICTED NOSTRILS SUGGEST A RELAXED STATE.

NECK AND HEAD POSITION: POSTURE AS A COMMUNICATOR

THE OVERALL POSITION OF THE HORSE'S NECK AND HEAD IS A SIGNIFICANT INDICATOR OF THEIR CONFIDENCE, ALERTNESS, AND INTENTION IN A GIVEN SITUATION.

- **HEAD AND NECK HELD HIGH:** THIS POSTURE OFTEN SIGNIFIES ALERTNESS, AWARENESS, AND SOMETIMES APPREHENSION OR DOMINANCE. A HORSE SURVEYING ITS SURROUNDINGS FROM A HIGH VANTAGE POINT IS ASSESSING POTENTIAL THREATS.
- **HEAD AND NECK LOW:** A LOWERED HEAD AND NECK CAN INDICATE RELAXATION, SUBMISSION, GRAZING, OR, IF ACCOMPANIED BY OTHER SIGNS, DISCOMFORT OR PAIN.
- **NECK ARCHED HIGH:** THIS IS OFTEN A SIGN OF PRIDE, EXCITEMENT, OR A CHALLENGE DISPLAY, PARTICULARLY IN STALLIONS OR DURING SPIRITED MOMENTS.
- **HEAD TUCKED IN:** A HEAD TUCKED TOWARDS THE CHEST CAN SIGNIFY SUBMISSION, ANXIETY, OR PAIN.

BODY AND LIMB SIGNALS: CONVEYING COMFORT, DISCOMFORT, AND

ALERTNESS

BEYOND THE HEAD AND NECK, THE HORSE'S ENTIRE BODY, INCLUDING ITS LIMBS AND TRUNK, COMMUNICATES VITAL INFORMATION ABOUT ITS INTERNAL STATE AND ITS INTERACTION WITH THE ENVIRONMENT AND OTHER BEINGS.

- **SHIFTING WEIGHT:** A HORSE THAT FREQUENTLY SHIFTS ITS WEIGHT FROM ONE HIND LEG TO ANOTHER CAN INDICATE RESTLESSNESS, ANTICIPATION, OR SLIGHT DISCOMFORT.
- **PAWING THE GROUND:** THIS IS A CLASSIC SIGN OF IMPATIENCE, FRUSTRATION, OR ANTICIPATION, ESPECIALLY BEFORE FEEDING OR AN ANTICIPATED EVENT.
- **STOMPING A FOOT:** A SINGLE FOOT STOMP USUALLY INDICATES ANNOYANCE, IRRITATION, OR DISCOMFORT, OFTEN DUE TO INSECTS.
- **KICKING OUT (HINDQUARTERS):** A QUICK KICK CAN BE A WARNING TO BACK OFF OR A SIGN OF ANNOYANCE. A MORE FORCEFUL KICK IS A SERIOUS DEFENSIVE OR AGGRESSIVE ACTION.
- **BUCKING:** BUCKING IS A CLEAR SIGN OF EXUBERANCE, PLAYFULNESS, OR THE EXPRESSION OF DISCOMFORT OR RESISTANCE.
- **REARING:** REARING IS A POWERFUL DISPLAY OF DOMINANCE, FEAR, OR PROTEST. IT'S A SERIOUS SIGNAL THAT REQUIRES IMMEDIATE ATTENTION AND CAREFUL HANDLING.
- **STRIKING WITH A FORELEG:** THIS IS A DEFENSIVE OR AGGRESSIVE MANEUVER, OFTEN USED WHEN A HORSE FEELS CORNERED OR THREATENED.
- **FLANK BITING:** A HORSE MAY NIP AT ITS OWN FLANK IF IT IS EXPERIENCING DISCOMFORT OR PAIN IN THAT AREA.
- **EARS FLICKING:** SIMILAR TO EARS POINTING BACK, THIS CAN INDICATE ANNOYANCE OR IRRITATION, ESPECIALLY WHEN DIRECTED AT A RIDER'S AIDS.

TAIL POSTURES: A CLEAR INDICATOR OF EMOTIONAL STATE

THE TAIL IS A HIGHLY VISIBLE AND OFTEN RELIABLE INDICATOR OF A HORSE'S EMOTIONAL STATE, CONVEYING FEELINGS RANGING FROM CONTENTMENT TO AGITATION AND FEAR.

- **HELD HIGH AND SWISHING GENTLY:** THIS OFTEN INDICATES INTEREST, ALERTNESS, OR MILD EXCITEMENT, ESPECIALLY WHEN COMBINED WITH FORWARD-POINTING EARS.
- **HELD LOW OR BETWEEN THE LEGS:** THIS IS A STRONG SIGN OF FEAR, SUBMISSION, OR DISTRESS.
- **SWISHING VIGOROUSLY:** RAPID AND FORCEFUL SWISHING OF THE TAIL IS USUALLY A SIGN OF ANNOYANCE, IRRITATION, OR ANGER. IT CAN ALSO BE AN INDICATOR OF PAIN.
- **TAIL TUCKED UNDER:** THIS IS A CLEAR SIGN OF FEAR, SUBMISSION, OR PAIN.
- **TAIL FANNED OUT:** THIS CAN OCCUR DURING EXCITEMENT OR DISTRESS.
- **TAIL HELD STIFFLY TO THE SIDE:** THIS CAN INDICATE A DOMINANCE DISPLAY OR AGGRESSION IN SOME CONTEXTS.

VOCALIZATION AND SOUNDS: BEYOND THE WHINNY

WHILE HORSES ARE PRIMARILY NON-VERBAL COMMUNICATORS, THEIR VOCALIZATIONS ALSO PLAY A ROLE IN THEIR COMMUNICATION REPERTOIRE. UNDERSTANDING THESE SOUNDS CAN ADD ANOTHER LAYER TO YOUR INTERPRETATION.

- **NICKER:** A SOFT, LOW-PITCHED SOUND, OFTEN MADE WHEN GREETING A FAMILIAR PERSON OR HORSE, OR WHEN ANTICIPATING FOOD. IT'S GENERALLY A FRIENDLY AND WELCOMING SOUND.
- **WHINNY/NEIGH:** A LOUDER, LONGER CALL, OFTEN USED FOR LONG-DISTANCE COMMUNICATION, TO LOCATE HERD MATES, OR EXPRESS EXCITEMENT, ANXIETY, OR LONELINESS.
- **SNORT:** A SHARP EXHALATION THROUGH THE NOSTRILS. A SNORT CAN INDICATE EXCITEMENT, NERVOUSNESS, CURIOSITY, OR A SIGNAL TO ALERT OTHERS TO POTENTIAL DANGER. A SOFT SNORT CAN BE A SIGN OF RELAXATION.
- **SQUEAL:** A HIGH-PITCHED, SHARP VOCALIZATION, OFTEN HEARD DURING PLAY OR AGGRESSIVE ENCOUNTERS, SUCH AS ESTABLISHING DOMINANCE.
- **GROAN:** CAN INDICATE PAIN, EXERTION, OR DEEP RELAXATION.
- **TEETH GRINDING:** AS MENTIONED EARLIER, THIS CAN SIGNAL PAIN OR DISCOMFORT, OR BE A SIGN OF SUBMISSION.

PUTTING IT ALL TOGETHER: INTERPRETING COMPLEX HORSE BODY LANGUAGE SCENARIOS

INTERPRETING HORSE BODY LANGUAGE IS NOT ABOUT IDENTIFYING A SINGLE CUE BUT RATHER ABOUT OBSERVING THE ENTIRE HORSE AND SYNTHESIZING MULTIPLE SIGNALS. A HORSE THAT IS PINNING ITS EARS, STARING HARD, AND HAS ITS TAIL CLAMPED DOWN IS UNDOUBTEDLY CONVEYING AGGRESSION AND A DESIRE FOR SPACE. CONVERSELY, A HORSE WITH SOFT EYES, RELAXED EARS, AND A GENTLY SWISHING TAIL IS LIKELY FEELING COMFORTABLE AND CONTENT.

CONSIDER A HORSE THAT REPEATEDLY SHIFTS ITS WEIGHT, FLICKS ITS EARS, AND SWISHES ITS TAIL. THIS COMBINATION MIGHT INDICATE MILD FRUSTRATION OR IMPATIENCE, PERHAPS WAITING FOR SOMETHING TO HAPPEN OR FEELING SLIGHTLY ANNOYED BY A RIDER'S AIDS. A HORSE THAT STANDS WITH ITS HEAD LOW, EYES SOFT, AND EARS RELAXED IS IN A STATE OF CALM. HOWEVER, IF THE SAME LOW HEAD IS ACCOMPANIED BY PINNED EARS AND A TUCKED TAIL, THE INTERPRETATION SHIFTS DRAMATICALLY TO ONE OF FEAR OR DISCOMFORT.

COMMON HORSE BODY LANGUAGE MISINTERPRETATIONS AND HOW TO AVOID THEM

MANY COMMON MISUNDERSTANDINGS ARISE FROM MISINTERPRETING A HORSE'S SIGNALS IN ISOLATION OR WITHOUT CONSIDERING THE CONTEXT. FOR EXAMPLE, A HORSE THAT YAWNS MIGHT BE INTERPRETED AS BORED, BUT IT CAN ALSO BE A SIGN OF RELIEF OR RELAXATION AFTER A PERIOD OF TENSION.

ANOTHER COMMON ERROR IS ASSUMING A HORSE'S INTENTIONS ARE ALWAYS MALICIOUS. A HORSE THAT BUMPS INTO YOU MIGHT SIMPLY BE SEEKING ATTENTION OR BE UNAWARE OF YOUR PRESENCE, RATHER THAN DELIBERATELY TRYING TO PUSH YOU OVER. ALWAYS REMEMBER THAT HORSES ARE INDIVIDUALS, AND THEIR COMMUNICATION CAN VARY. LEARNING TO READ YOUR SPECIFIC HORSE'S NUANCES IS KEY TO BUILDING A STRONG PARTNERSHIP.

TO AVOID MISINTERPRETATIONS:

- OBSERVE THE ENTIRE HORSE: DON'T FOCUS ON JUST ONE BODY PART.
- CONSIDER THE CONTEXT: WHERE IS THE HORSE? WHAT IS HAPPENING AROUND IT?
- LOOK FOR CLUSTERS OF SIGNALS: MULTIPLE CUES POINTING IN THE SAME DIRECTION ARE MORE RELIABLE.
- RECOGNIZE INDIVIDUAL DIFFERENCES: EACH HORSE HAS ITS OWN PERSONALITY AND COMMUNICATION STYLE.
- BE PATIENT AND OBSERVANT: CONSISTENT OBSERVATION OVER TIME WILL BUILD YOUR UNDERSTANDING.

PRACTICAL APPLICATIONS OF A HORSE BODY LANGUAGE CHART

A THOROUGH UNDERSTANDING OF HORSE BODY LANGUAGE, FACILITATED BY A VISUAL HORSE BODY LANGUAGE CHART, HAS NUMEROUS PRACTICAL APPLICATIONS. FOR RIDERS, IT MEANS BEING ABLE TO RESPOND APPROPRIATELY TO THEIR HORSE'S NEEDS, ADJUSTING THEIR AIDS AND EXPECTATIONS ACCORDINGLY. THIS LEADS TO MORE EFFECTIVE TRAINING, BETTER PERFORMANCE, AND A SAFER RIDING EXPERIENCE.

FOR HANDLERS AND TRAINERS, IT'S ABOUT RECOGNIZING SIGNS OF STRESS OR DISCOMFORT DURING TRAINING SESSIONS, ALLOWING THEM TO MODIFY THEIR APPROACH TO AVOID CREATING NEGATIVE ASSOCIATIONS. IN HERD MANAGEMENT, UNDERSTANDING THE SUBTLE DOMINANCE AND SUBMISSION CUES CAN HELP PREVENT CONFLICTS AND ENSURE A PEACEFUL ENVIRONMENT. EVEN FOR CASUAL OBSERVERS, COMPREHENDING EQUINE COMMUNICATION ENRICHES THE EXPERIENCE OF WATCHING THESE MAGNIFICENT ANIMALS.

ULTIMATELY, INVESTING TIME IN LEARNING TO READ HORSE BODY LANGUAGE IS AN INVESTMENT IN THE HORSE'S WELFARE AND THE STRENGTH OF YOUR RELATIONSHIP. A HORSE BODY LANGUAGE CHART SERVES AS A FOUNDATIONAL REFERENCE, BUT TRUE MASTERY COMES FROM CONSISTENT PRACTICE AND ATTENTIVE OBSERVATION IN REAL-WORLD INTERACTIONS.

FAQ

Q: WHAT IS THE MOST IMPORTANT PART OF A HORSE'S BODY TO READ FOR ITS EMOTIONS?

A: WHILE ALL PARTS OF A HORSE'S BODY CONTRIBUTE TO ITS COMMUNICATION, THE EARS AND EYES ARE OFTEN CONSIDERED THE MOST IMMEDIATE AND RELIABLE INDICATORS OF A HORSE'S EMOTIONAL STATE AND FOCUS. THEIR RAPID MOVEMENTS AND EXPRESSIVE NATURE PROVIDE QUICK INSIGHTS INTO ALERTNESS, FEAR, AND IRRITATION.

Q: CAN A HORSE'S TAIL POSTURE CHANGE VERY QUICKLY?

A: YES, A HORSE'S TAIL POSTURE CAN CHANGE VERY RAPIDLY, ESPECIALLY IN RESPONSE TO SUDDEN STIMULI OR SHIFTS IN EMOTIONAL STATE. A QUICK FLICK MIGHT INDICATE MILD ANNOYANCE, WHILE A TAIL BEING CLAMPED DOWN TIGHTLY SUGGESTS SIGNIFICANT FEAR OR DISTRESS.

Q: IS A HORSE THAT YAWNS ALWAYS RELAXED?

A: NOT NECESSARILY. WHILE YAWNING CAN BE A SIGN OF RELAXATION OR RELIEF AFTER TENSION, IT CAN ALSO BE A SIGN OF

STRESS, FATIGUE, OR EVEN MILD DISCOMFORT IN CERTAIN CONTEXTS. IT'S IMPORTANT TO LOOK AT OTHER BODY LANGUAGE CUES TO GET A COMPLETE PICTURE.

Q: WHAT DOES IT MEAN WHEN A HORSE PINS ITS EARS FLAT BACK?

A: PINNING ITS EARS FLAT BACK IS A STRONG SIGNAL OF ANGER, EXTREME IRRITATION, OR AGGRESSION. IT IS A CLEAR WARNING THAT THE HORSE IS UNHAPPY AND MAY BE PREPARING TO BITE OR STRIKE. IT'S A CUE TO GIVE THE HORSE SPACE.

Q: HOW CAN I TELL IF MY HORSE IS STRESSED OR ANXIOUS?

A: SIGNS OF STRESS OR ANXIETY IN A HORSE CAN INCLUDE WIDE EYES WITH VISIBLE SCLERA, PINNED EARS, FLARED NOSTRILS, TENSE BODY POSTURE, FREQUENT WEIGHT SHIFTING, PAWING, EXCESSIVE TAIL SWISHING, AND VOCALIZATIONS LIKE SQUEALS OR GROANS. OBSERVING A COMBINATION OF THESE CUES IS IMPORTANT.

Q: WHAT IS THE FLEHMEN RESPONSE IN HORSES?

A: THE FLEHMEN RESPONSE, WHERE A HORSE CURLS ITS UPPER LIP UPWARDS, IS A BEHAVIOR PRIMARILY USED TO DRAW SCENTS INTO THE VOMERONASAL ORGAN (JACOBSON'S ORGAN) LOCATED IN THE ROOF OF THE MOUTH. THIS ALLOWS THE HORSE TO ANALYZE SMELLS MORE THOROUGHLY, OFTEN IN RESPONSE TO NEW OR STRONG SCENTS LIKE URINE OR REPRODUCTIVE PHEROMONES.

Q: IF A HORSE NUDGES ME WITH ITS HEAD, IS IT BEING AGGRESSIVE?

A: NOT USUALLY. A GENTLE NUDGE IS OFTEN A SIGN OF SEEKING ATTENTION, AFFECTION, OR ENCOURAGEMENT, PARTICULARLY FROM FAMILIAR HANDLERS OR RIDERS. HOWEVER, IF THE NUDGE IS ACCOMPANIED BY PINNED EARS OR A HARD STARE, IT COULD BE A SIGN OF DOMINANCE OR AGGRESSION.

Q: HOW DOES A HORSE COMMUNICATE WHEN IT'S FEELING DOMINANT?

A: DOMINANT HORSES OFTEN EXHIBIT A HIGH HEAD AND NECK CARRIAGE, DIRECT STARES, STIFF MOVEMENTS, AND MAY USE VOCALIZATIONS LIKE SQUEALS OR ASSERTIVE NICKERS. THEY MAY ALSO TRY TO PUSH OR INTIMIDATE OTHERS. THEIR TAILS MIGHT BE HELD HIGH AND ACTIVELY SWISHED.

Q: WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN A HORSE STOMPING ITS FOOT AND PAWING THE GROUND?

A: PAWING THE GROUND IS TYPICALLY A REPETITIVE ACTION INDICATING IMPATIENCE, ANTICIPATION, OR FRUSTRATION, OFTEN SEEN BEFORE FEEDING OR AN ANTICIPATED EVENT. A SINGLE FOOT STOMP IS USUALLY A REACTION TO MINOR ANNOYANCE, IRRITATION, OR DISCOMFORT, OFTEN DUE TO INSECTS BITING.
