- SUGAR SKULLS (CALAVERAS): THESE COLORFUL SKULLS ARE SYMBOLIC OF DEATH AND ARE OFTEN INSCRIBED WITH THE NAMES OF THE DECEASED, REPRESENTING THE CYCLE OF LIFE AND MORTALITY.

LITERATURE AND ART
