Cleaning Different Bong Materials

The material of your bong will influence the best cleaning approach. Glass bongs are the most common and generally the easiest to clean using the isopropyl alcohol and salt method. The smooth surface of glass is resistant to most cleaning agents, and the alcohol won't damage it.

Silicone bongs offer a different cleaning challenge and advantage. Silicone is very durable and often dishwasher safe (check manufacturer instructions).
