Choosing Appropriate Fonts and Sizes

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Setting Line Spacing and Margins

Adequate line spacing (leading) is crucial for legibility. Aim for a line spacing of around 1.2 to 1.5 times the font size. Generous margins on all sides of the page provide breathing room and prevent text from feeling cramped. Standard margins are usually around 1 inch (2.54 cm) on all sides, but this can be adjusted based on your design.
