To make a double crochet, you'll first yarn over, then insert your hook into the designated stitch or space. You'll yarn over again and pull up a loop (you'll have three loops on your hook). The Slip Stitch (sl st)

To make a slip stitch, you'll insert your hook into the designated stitch or space, yarn over, and then pull the yarn through both the stitch/space and the loop already on your hook in one motion.

Finishing Off and Weaving in Ends

This involves cutting the yarn, leaving a tail of about 6 inches, and then pulling that tail completely through the last loop on your hook. This creates a secure knot.
