A: THE BABYLONIAN EXILE IS DEPICTED AS A PROFOUND CRISIS THAT CHALLENGED ISRAEL'S CORE BELIEFS BUT ULTIMATELY LED TO THEOLOGICAL REFINEMENT AND THE CONSOLIDATION OF JEWISH IDENTITY AND RELIGIOUS PRACTICES, SETTING THE STAGE FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF JUDAISM.

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
